CIRCLE UP!!

This week Hannibal continues his research while laid up in recovery mode. While constantly flexing, stretching and lifting his legs and their new hip, he has turned his mind the significance and wonder of the Waterworks at Botany. Yet another week of keen insights and discovery – thanks Hannibal!

On 29 April 1770 Captain James Cook made his first landfall in Australia at Botany Bay. He recognised a great place for hashing and the development of The Sydney Water Works which were established in Botany in 1858 and were fed by the many springs in the area including the chain of ponds in Sir Joseph Banks Park, Botany. The scheme was Sydney's major source of water for 30 years.

In 1886, the last year of full pumping, 1864 million gallons of water were supplied to Sydney from these water works.


Botany Water Reserve holds considerable value for Sydney and NSW because it was an essential source of water for brewing beer.

It also has regional importance on account of the substantial infrastructure it contains of the 1910's Southern and Western Suburbs Ocean Outfall Sewer System (SWSOOS No 1) and historic trails set by B2H3 hashers over the years, widely regarded as some of the best ever set trails.

The overall SWSOOS network remains Sydney's largest sewer system and as we have learned over the last few weeks carries out its job predominantly servicing the greater B2H3 hashing area, carefully placing its contents in the ocean at Malabar, which is also well within B2H3 territory.

It is good to know the site of Captain Cook's landfall has such an important part in the wellbeing of B2B3 members and that B2H3 continues Cooky's trailblazing and pioneering ways.
